Renee Kire

- b. 1997, lives and works in Brisbane
- Renee Kire is an early career artist who primarily uses installation and sculpture to revise the Minimalist agenda from a feminist perspective.
- Kire has completed a Bachelor of Fine Arts with Honours (Queensland College of Art, Griffith University, 2022) and has presented her work in spaces such as the Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts, Buxton Contemporary, Metro Arts and Outer Space.




Twist and Turn

- Through the desire to champion feminist art history, Renee Kire draws inspiration from overshadowed female artists to develop new techniques for testing the precarious nature of minimalist sculpture.
- Kire's sculptures assert presence in an engaging, playful exploration of form, colour and space.
- The shapes bend and push, challenging and reshaping the historically male-dominated narratives around Minimalism and exploring the delicate balance between the presence and absence of the maker.



Twist and Turn

- For Kire, the viewer completes the work.
- This exhibition encourages you to explore the work as you move around the space: to look up and down and travel side-to-side as you follow the twists and turns of Kire's work.

Process

- Kire utilises new techniques such as laser cutting paired with slow, manual processes such as hand painting.
- Renee designs the shapes that create the forms. They are lasercut from timber then assembled, sanded and hand painted.
- Hand painting the works is important to Kire – a slow process that maintains the maker's mark and relationship to the work, balancing the absence and presence of the maker.



Addressing Art History: Gender Inequity in Minimalism

- Kire works to re-write the narrative on overlooked figures from art history – particularly women from the <u>Minimalist</u> movement.
- Most artists credited with establishing Minimalism as an art movement are male – for example, Frank Stella, Sol LeWitt, Carle Andre and Donald Judd.
- Artists such as <u>Judy Chicago</u> worked for years in this field but this formative period of Chicago's work is not as well known.



Addressing Art History: Gender Inequity in Minimalism


- Kire's works have a demanding presence: they
 physically take up space in all directions. The forms
 push forward, back and stretch from side-to-side –
 physically taking up space as an act of
 representation.
- Kire uses materials and methods that are typically coded as 'masculine' to create shapes and forms that curve softly – aesthetics that are typically coded as 'feminine'.


Create your own shapes that twist and turn!


