The Weight of Experience

ATRIUM GALLERY

Lincoln Austin, assisted by Artist Chelsea Jewell, presents a new, site-specific sculptural, tensegrity and light-based work *The Weight of Experience*. Suspended in the Atrium Gallery a geometric form catches light and creates shadows, shifting and morphing throughout the day and night, overlayed with a colour-coded animation of transformed community-submitted poetry texts.

The Weight of Experience encourages audiences to reflect on the life experiences we each carry within us, and the Queer experience of vigilantly reading and interpreting code to assess safety and belonging.

Sally Smart is one of Australia's most dynamic and sought after contemporary visual artists. Living and working on Wurundjeri/Boon Wurrung Country, Melbourne, Smart is recognised internationally for her large-scale assemblage installations, collage painting and film performance works.


The artist takes collage out of its traditional domain of small-scale paper and scales it up to dramatic effect, applying it to other media, including textiles, sculpture and even metal, creating captivating installations that invite and suggest multiple perspectives and interpretations.

Rosella Namok Sure Lines

The Gold Award 2024 winner Rosella Namok returns to RMOA with Rosella Namok: Sure Lines. Namok's paintings reflect both traditional stories and contemporary themes across cultural and social concerns with candid observations about changing lifestyles and the environment. Through a technique developed by watching her grandmother drawing in the sand, Rosella often creates patterned, linear arrangements by pulling her fingers through the layers of paint.

Danish Quapoor desolate vessels

Danish Quapoor has memorialised suspended moments within the cyclical timeline of death, grief and regrowth. desolate vessels are devoid of physical contents, yet metaphorically filled with personal lamentations and broader considerations such as the climate crisis.

Danish Quapoor is a visual artist based on Gurambilbarra Country/Townsville. His multidisciplinary practice is typically unified by repetitive processes and a flat-colour style in which stylised forms float amidst sparse compositions.


RMOA Collection Beyond Abstraction






